

## PANEL ONE

## In Search of Perfect Leaders - Do They Exist?

### Joe Cerrell

Joe Cerrell, who has worked in politics for 41 years, is chairman of Cerrell Associates, a prominent Los Angeles-based public affairs, public relations and campaign management firm. He has played key roles in the presidential campaigns of John F. Kennedy, Lyndon Johnson, Hubert Humphrey, Lloyd Bentsen, John Glenn and Al Gore. He has managed a wide variety of local and state campaigns and pioneered the field of judicial campaign management. He is a Distinguished Visiting Professor in political science at Pepperdine University. He also lectures and conducts seminars and political forums across the nation.



### Gil Garcetti

Los Angeles County District Attorney Gil Garcetti was first elected in 1992, then re-elected in 1996. He has worked in the Los Angeles County District Attorney's office since 1968. He was born and raised in South Central Los Angeles, attended public schools, received his undergraduate degree from the University of Southern California, and received his law degree from the University of California, Los Angeles. He has been married for more than 30 years to his wife Sukey. Their daughter is a deputy district attorney and his son is a Rhodes scholar completing his doctoral studies in England.



### Shawn Steele

Shawn Steele is vice chairman of the California Republican Party. An attorney by training, he has held numerous political posts and has worked on a wide range of campaigns. He has written several articles for newspapers and political publications and has served as an assistant professor at Cleveland Chiropractic College of Los Angeles since 1991, an unpaid position. He received his bachelor's degree in history and his secondary teaching credential from California State University, Northridge, a master's degree in history from the University of Southern California and his law degree from Northrop Law School.

## Turning Ideas Into Profits - The "Risks and Rewards"

### **Casey Bernay**

Casey Bernay is an adjunct professor of entrepreneurship for the George L. Graziadio School of Business and Management at Pepperdine University. Since graduating from California State University, Northridge, with a bachelor's degree in theater, she has embarked on several entrepreneurial efforts. She founded one of the first independent licensing agencies in Hollywood, and she worked to bring new technologies and computer literacy to leaders of the entertainment labor unions. Using her entrepreneurial expertise she founded Hollywood Hands-On computer learning center, which offered low-cost classes to union workers in the entertainment industry. She returned to school and received a master's degree in business administration from Pepperdine University. She has since launched a consulting business and continues focusing on education.

### Tim Braheem

Tim Braheem is president of First Rate Financial Group in Westlake Village, which helps individuals obtain home mortgages. A frequent speaker to loan and real estate groups, he also writes extensively and trains new loan officers. He is noted for the discipline he applies to developing and maintaining his client contacts.

### **Brendon Clark**

12-year-old Brendon Clark of Encino envisioned creating a unique product, cologne for young boys, then worked for two years with his mother Layne to make it reality. He donates a portion of his profits from the cologne, called Brendon, to Children's Hospital Los Angeles. He has appeared on *The Howie Mandel Show, Extra Entertainment*, the *Donny and Marie* show, and on *E! News Daily*. His story was featured on page 1 of the *Los Angeles Daily News* and in the *Los Angeles Times*. Brendon says he wants to show other children that there are no limits to what they can achieve.

### Howard P. House, M.D.

Howard P. House, M.D., 91, is internationally recognized for his pioneering efforts to restore hearing in the hearing impaired. He is the founder of the House Ear Clinic. He received his medical degree in 1935 from the University of Southern California, which nearly rejected his application for admission because of his poor academic record. Years later, he was bestowed with USC's Outstanding Alumnus of the Year award for his medical research and surgical procedures that have restored or improved the hearing of thousands of individuals, including former President Ronald Reagan. He lives in Los Angeles.




### **Monica Gugel**

Tim Leets graduated magna cum laude from Cal Poly San Luis Obispo with a degree in accounting. Working as a certified public accountant for Arthur Anderson & Co. after college, he gained valuable insight about the business world by working on mergers and consulting on various projects. Using his business skills, he launched his own marketing business, which has affiliates throughout the U.S. and around the world. He has coached many individuals to greater levels of success, and he conducts numerous seminars on Playing to Win in Business and in Life.





### **HOBY Background**

In 1958, actor Hugh O'Brian was priveleged to spend nine days in Africa with Dr. Albert Schweitzer, whose remarks and observations were both profound and stimulating.

In reference to youth and education, Schweitzer told O'Brian: "The most important thing in education is to teach young people to think for themselves."

Dr. Schweitzer's words deeply moved O'Brian to explore the avenues through which he might influence the lives of our young people. Gradually, a concept evolved, and the Hugh O'Brian Youth Foundation (HOBY) was born.

The HOBY program is simple: Bring a select group of high school sophomores with demonstrated leadership qualities together with a group of distinguished leaders in business, industry, education, government and the professions, and let the two interact. Using a seminar question-and-answer format, the young people get a realistic look at the workings of the American incentive system, which broadens their perspective and better enables them to think for themselves.

High school sophomores are chosen as the focal point for the HOBY program not only because their age is critical in focusing on future goals and forming opinions for adulthood, but also because they have the opportunity to create a "ripple effect" from their HOBY experience in their remaining high school years.

### **Selection Process**

Nomination materials are sent in September of each year to the 22,000 public and private high schools in the United States. All sophomores are eligible to attend at one of the three- to four-day seminars held in all 50 states, the District of Columbia, the Bahamas, Canada and Mexico. An outstanding sophomore leader is nominated by each school and is certified by its principal.

These expense-paid workshops focus on the theme "America's Incentive System," and encourage the young leaders toward responsible citizenship of community volunteerism and service. One young man or woman is selected to represent his or her site at a week-long World Leadership Congress held in late summer. In addition, HOBY invites young leaders from at least 30 countries to attend this international seminar.

### **Results of HOBY Seminars**

The effectiveness of HOBY seminars is noted in the results of HOBY's most recent evaluation:

- 80% of Ambassadors noted they had a better understanding of their free enterprise, economic and American political systems.
- 98.% said they know what steps to take to be a better leader.
- 98% said they know volunteering is important.
- 99% said HOBY encouraged them to think independently
- The evaluation found that HOBY encourages Ambassadors to set goals and that the responsibility for personal
  growth and leadership development is placed squarely on them.

### Mission and Objectives

- To seek out, recognize and reward leadership potential in high school sophomores from throughout California, the United States and abroad.
- To encourage and assist members of this formative age group in their quest for self-identification and self-development.
- To interface these potential idealers with recognized leaders in business, government, science, education and the professions through give-and-take sessions.
- To motivate these young leaders to their responsibility and the importance of volunteerism.
- To stimulate opportunities for these young people to demonstrate their leadership abilities when they return home for betterment of community and country.
