

Jane Hansen

Jane Hansen is currently the President of HRP Systems, Inc., a small aerospace company in Torrance, California, that she co-founded over 10 years ago. Ms. Hansen has nearly 25 years of experience in aerospace engineering and management working on aircraft, spacecraft, rockets and ballistic missiles for companies such as Microcosm, Eidetics, TRW, NASA JPL and Northrop-Grumman. She has a B.S. in Applied Mathematics from California Polytechnic State University in San Luis Obispo and an M.B.A. from Pepperdine University in Malibu, California.

Rob Staehle

Robert L. Staehle is Formulation Team lead for the Jet Propulsion Laboratory's Information Technologies and Software Systems Division. Prior to that, he was deputy manager of the X2000 Advanced Avionics Project, and the Europa Orbiter Project. His career began with his student experiment, Bacteria Aboard Skylab, flown twice in 1973-74. He started in 1977 at JPL assisting with Voyager's Jupiter encounter planning, and later contributed to a variety of advanced studies in lunar and planetary exploration. Since 1981 he has been a member of the Mars Underground,



advocating the first human expedition to Mars. Rob also enjoys hiking, mountain biking, and photography.

Marion D. Thompson works for The Aerospace Corporation as a Project Engineer for the Military Satellite Communications Joint Program Office at the Air Force Space and Missile Systems Center, Los Angeles Air Force Base in El Segundo, California. Ms. Thompson is responsible for technical direction of military satellite integration to the United States government Evolved Expendable Launch Vehicles for the Defense Satellite Communications System III (DSCS III) Program, the Wideband Gapfiller Satellite (WGS) Systems Program and the Advanced Extremely High Frequency Program

offices. She graduated from the Florida State University in 1993 with a Bachelor of Science degree in Industrial Engineering and is currently attending the University of Southern California, School of Aeronautics/Astronautics.

Jussi "John" Olavi Vilja

John was born in Van Nuys, California. He attended California State University at Northridge and graduated with a B.S. in Mechanical Engineering in 1982. He worked for Rockwell International as a Development Engineer for the Space Shuttle Main Engine for 7 years. "What Do I Really Need to Get Into the College of My Choice?"

Pamela Jolicoeur

Dr. Pamela Jolicoeur is a professor of sociology, provost and dean of the faculty at California Lutheran University. During her tenure, she has served as vice president for academic affairs, associate dean, department chair and faculty chair, and was appointed a Danforth Fellow. As a scholar, Dr. Jolicoeur has presented and published research on higher education and the sociology of religion. Currently, she is engaged in a study of the long-term impact of different college experiences on alumni.



Carlos Sardo

Carlos A. Sardo was born and raised in New York City. "Volunteer Projects You Can Sink Your Teeth Into"



Brandon Keefe

When Brandon Keefe was 8, he decided to create a library at Hollygrove, a residential treatment center for abused children in Hollywood. His idea was simple, 70 kids at Hollygrove needed books to help them learn to read and Brandon knew that he and his fellow students had great books at home that they no longer read. Brandon organized a book drive with his fellow students to recycle their books for Hollygrove. Over the next three years, Brandon continued his annual book drives and the library began to grow. The community heard about the red-haired boy's dream of a Hollygrove library and organizations

stepped in to build bookshelves, people volunteered their time, librarians bar-coded the books to create a true lending library and mentors were trained to sit down with the children and teach them to read. Today, Brandon is 17 and a senior at Chaminade High School. He serves as spokesperson on the Board of Directors of BookEnds, the nonprofit organization that he co-founded. Using Brandon's model, more than 110,000 students have learned the joys of community service through organizing BookEnds' book drives. 125 libraries have been developed in needy schools and youth organizations through the donation of more than 450,000 books, giving more than 70,000 kids the tools they need to learn to read.



Niko and Theo Milonopoulos

The City of Los Angeles' proposed legislation to ban the sale of gun ammunition citywide was the idea of twin brothers Niko and Theo Milonopoulos, then 15. The pair, 10th graders at Campbell Hall High School in North Hollywood, are co-founders of Kidz-Voice-LA, a non-profit organization run by kids for kids, which lobbies for gun control legislation and other issues that impact kids' lives. Children

lobbying for gun control laws at the local level, on behalf of other children and themselves, is a unique and successful approach in addressing one of America's most

contentious issues. Nick and Theo's work has touched the lives of thousands through television coverage of their events and during interviews on CBS, CNN, "The Roseanne Show" and PBS. Their op-ed pieces published in the Los Angeles Times and the Los Angeles Daily News – as well as articles written about their work in Parade, Child and React magazines – have been read by people throughout the nation.





Brittany Roach

Brittany Roach is a big-hearted 14-year-old girl who attends Paul Revere Middle School in Brentwood, California. She has participated in community service most of her life and became a Girl Scout in first grade. In May of 2001, Brittany received the Silver Award – the highest honor given to Cadette Girl Scouts. For her Silver Award project, she collected 3,000 pounds of humanitarian aide, which was donated to three Polish orphanages. In Brittany's words, "Volunteering has provided me with opportunities to increase my self-esteem, self-worth and global awareness. I do these charitable projects not for the glory and praise

of others, but for self-respect." This aspiring actress' life philosophy is, "God has put us all on the Earth for a reason; my purpose is to help others."

"A Lesson in Civics"



John Duran

Mayor Pro Tempore John J. Duran was elected to the West Hollywood City Council on March 6, 2001. His election was the continuation of a long and dedicated history of service to the West Hollywood community. From 2000 to 2001 he served as Vice-Chair of the West Hollywood Rent Stabilization Commission, adjudicating appeals for landlord/tenant disputes and making policy recommendations on affordable housing and protection of tenants' rights. Since 1996, Mayor Pro Tempore Duran has

also served as a volunteer attorney for the Coalition for Economic Survival (CES) Legal Clinic, where he continues to represent tenants—many of them West Hollywood residents—on issues including unlawful detainers, wrongful conviction and discrimination. Mayor Pro Tempore Duran, a native Angeleno, received his law degree from Western State University in Orange County, and leads one of Southern California's prominent law firms on gay and lesbian rights and AIDS law.

Brad Kane

Brad S. Kane grew up in Los Angeles and volunteered on his first presidential campaign when he was still too young to vote. By age 18, he was interning in the district office of Congressman Anthony C. Beilenson. While attending Hastings College of the Law, Brad taught two classes of ESL students their rights and responsibilities under the law as part of the Street Law Program. He also tutored three different constitutional law sections in the LEOP program and externed for United States District Judge Stanley Weigel. After graduation, Brad moved to Alaska and clerked for the Chief Justice of



the Alaska Supreme Court. He practiced law in Alaska and California at major national law firms for 10 years, before he left to manage the United States Senate campaign of state auditor Ed Flannigan in Vermont. After an unsuccessful campaign, he opened his own law firm, where he continues to make the world a better place, one person at a time.

Craig Lincoln

Craig Lincoln competed in his first diving contest at age 14, and never looked back. His participation in the sport took him from junior high, through high school, and on to the University of Minnesota where he led the swimming and diving team in scoring. In addition to winning Big Ten Conference and NCAA championships, he was named team captain, earned an academic scholarship, and was awarded the University's prestigious Conference Medal of Honor for outstanding scholarship and athletic achievement.

His success in diving took him all over the United States and Canada, to Europe and South America, and culminated at the Olympic Games in Munich, Germany. There, representing the United States against the best in the world, he won the bronze medal in the springboard event. Along the way, he earned five national champion titles, three college and three AAU "All-American" titles, and made many, many friends.

When Craig left the world of athletics for the corporate world, he applied the lessons he had learned as an Olympian to become vice president of sales and management training for a \$40-billion dollar financial company. There he managed a team of trainers and specialists and developed leadership programs for managers and senior executives to improve performance, define goals, and coach their business teams.

Since 1996, Craig has traveled extensively, leading seminars and working with sales teams in the U.S., Europe, China and Hong Kong. But he never lost his love for diving. He remained active in the sport, and in 2001, he returned to the Munich Olympic Stadium for the World Masters Aquatics Games. There, in the same pool and on the same platform, 30 years after winning the Olympic bronze medal, Craig reprised his dives against the best masters divers in the world – this time he won the gold.

Selection Process

Nomination materials are sent in September of each year to the 22,000 public and private high schools in the United States. All sophomores are eligible to attend one of the three to four-day seminars held in all 50 states, the District of Columbia, the Bahamas, Canada and Mexico. An outstanding sophomore leader is nominated by each school and is certified by its principal.

Results of HOBY Seminars

The effectiveness of HOBY seminars is noted in the results of HOBY's most recent evaluation:

- 80 percent of ambassadors noted they had a better understanding of the free enterprise, economic and American political systems.
- 98 percent said they know what steps to take to be a better leader.

These expense-paid workshops focus on the them "America's Incentive System," and encourage the young leaders toward responsible citizenship of community volunteerism and service. One young man or woman is selected to represent his or her site at a week-long World Leadership Congress held in late summer. In addition, HOBY invites young leaders from at least 30 countries to attend this international seminar.
